In particular, students will learn about the importance of the value of natural resources for regions that uses area-specific natural environments as tourism resources. Finally, students will consider the economic significance of some new tourism and examine problems in tourism. Note that since this course deals with economic and econometric models, prior knowledge of mathematics and statistics is required.

- (1) Comparison between general policies and tourism policies.
- (2) Comparison of Tourism policies by the national government and by local governments.
- (3) Policies by tourism departments and by other related departments such as those of economics, urban planning, heritage conservation and environment.
- (4) The role of government in tourism considering roles of stakeholders such as enterprises, citizens groups and tourists.
- (5) The historical transitions of tourism policies to understand the characteristics and roles of the policies.
- (6) Relationship with the social, economical environment and tourism polies

Through the lectures, students will understand not only about each policies but also about significances of government for tourism studies.

Course Contents

The lectures will consist of the three topics: ①understanding the characteristics of current tourism policies from the viewpoint of the national and local governments, ② historical understanding of tourism policies, and ③ on the basis of ① and ②, we will discuss new topics of tourism policies in the future, such as the SDGs of tourism and tourism resilience.

Course Contents

Speaking of "international tourism," there are two types: inbound tourism, which welcomes tourists from overseas to Japan, and outbound tourism, in which Japanese tourists head for overseas travel. In the countries of the world, these international tourism policies are extremely various. For example, regarding inbound policies, there are a wide variety of themes such as visa issuance, policies of national tourism organizations (NTOs), the role of DMOs, and the direction of tourism area development.

In this class, we will first learn about the ideal form of international tourism advocated by UNWTO (United Nations World Tourism Organization), and then the world tourism from the background of mass tourism and its era, which began in Europe in the middle of the 19th century, an overview of the flow from then to the present.

Next, we will study mainly the inbound tourism-oriented countries and tourism area development policies in the EU, where tourism advanced countries are concentrated, and compare them with Japan's tourism policies.

In addition, we will deepen understanding while learning the success stories of each country on how tourism administration and the tourism industry should cooperate or divide roles in order to improve the tourism power of the country.

In this course, we will focus on various types of heritage, not limited to the World Heritage sites, and take up examples of heritage tourism both in Japan and abroad to further understand the relationship between heritage and tourism. The significance of heritage for contemporary society will also be discussed.

This course includes lectures on the laws, regulations, and contracts that relate to engaging in this wide-ranging business. The instructor introduces case studies and explains the legal throught process. After that, students perform their own legal analysis. A quiz or a statement of opinion is used to confirm that students can think critically in a legal manner.

(2) Students learn a wide range of legal knowledge necessary for future employment and useful for licensing, for example, taking the Certified Administrative Procedures Legal Specialist Examination or the Registered Management Consultant Examination.

(3) Suitably for the College of Tourism, this course provides opportunities to think deeply not just about theoretical issues but also about how various laws are actually applied. Various professionals (e.g., Licensed Tax Accountant, Labor and Social Security Attorney, Certified Administrative Procedures Legal Specialist) are invited to lectures, when appropriate, to talk

Course Contents

Tourism, one of the leading industries of the 21st century, is currently struggling due to the COVID-19 pandemic. On the other hand, tourism is attracting a lot of attention for its important role as a means of solving social problems in Japan and abroad. Furthermore, due to the impact of the COVID-19 pandemic, a worldwide movement towards "Responsible Tourism" (the idea that everyone involved in tourism should take responsibility for its effects on the environment, society, culture, and the economy) is spreading. In this seminar, we will focus on tourism as a means of solving local social issues (included inbound tourism), and conduct group discussions about travel product development and sales promotion strategies that can overcome the COVID-19 pandemic and help solve social issues through tourism.

The seminar consists of three steps conducted as one set: a lecture that introduces basic knowledge and specific examples for each topic, a group discussion to discuss the lecture topics in small groups, and a presentation of the results of the group discussion and review. As specific topics for investigation, the first half of the seminar will focus on route development and sales promotion strategies for the Sky Hop Bus, a sightseeing bus that lets passengers get on and off freely. The second half will focus on the product development for one-day bus tours of Hato Bus.

This seminar aims to let participants reach a level where they can actually work on product planning with an eye on solving social issues and ensuring safety during the COVID-19 pandemic, then sell it to the market as travel products.

Through these activities, participants will acquire not only planning and proposal skills, but also practical and essential skills as businesspersons, such as teamwork and presentation skills.

As fieldwork, a one-day Sky Hop Bus tour in Tokyo will be conducted on April 23th (Sunday). Attendance at the fieldwork is strongly recommended.

Students are required to take the fall semester course "Travel Industry Seminar 1 (B)" consecutively.

The theme of social issues, especially "SDGs and tourism town planning," will be discussed through card games and group discussions. This is also an important theme in terms of the significance and role of tourism in the post-Corona era.

The class will consist of four steps: a "lecture" to introduce basic knowledge and specific examples of each theme, a "card game" to learn about the theme in a fun and lively atmosphere, a "group discussion" to discuss the lecture with a small group, and a "presentation" of each group's discussion. The first half will focus on "SDGs and tourism town planning: Creation and proposal of a tourism town planning for Namegata City of Ibaraki Prefecture," while the last half will focus on "Planning and proposal of a town walking guide using the voice application "Emorip"".

Instead of past case studies, the participants will work on real cases in real time, formulate local revitalization plans that connect tourism/travel with solutions to social issues, and actually give their presentation to Namegata City and HAKUHODO Inc. Through these activities, participants will acquire not only planning and proposal skills, but also practical and essential skills as businesspersons, such as teamwork and presentation skills.

Since border control measures in Japan and China have been eased, full recovery of inbound demand to Japan progresses at once and there is a strong possibility of a sudden and explosive boom. It is extremely important to prepare for this at an early stage. In this seminar, we will focus on "inbound travel product planning," and actually engage in planning, development, and sales promotion, aiming to achieve a level at which we can sell travel products to the market. In particular, the key point is to plan and develop products from the viewpoints of "safety and security" and "sustainability" with an awareness of the new coronaviruses.

Under the guidance of the planning manager and staff of JTB Global Marketing & Travel (JTB GMT), participants will work on product planning, development, and sales plan creation for a new course of SUNRISE TOURS, an optional tour, for inbound travelers and foreigners living in Japan. If the new courses planned and developed here are judged to have reached a certain level, they will be sold as actual products through overseas travel agencies and JTB GMT's sales website. In addition, participants will learn practical and essential skills as businesspersons, such as teamwork and presentation skills. On Sunday May 28, fieldwork will be conducted in cooperation with the company (one-day Sunrise Tour course: Fuji-Hakone Tour). Attendance at the fieldwork is strongly recommended. In Japan, the value of Satoyama was discovered, and residents are subjectively engaged in conservation activities. Satoyama has also become popular as a venue of art festival and a tourist site. These show us a kind of potential, but at the same time need to be critically analyzed. The course explores how ecological places can be created in times of change.

From the viewpoint of tourism and through analysis of the social and cultural meaning of the hotel as the basic tourism facility, this course aims to understand the city as the node of mobility accompanied by globalization.

Course Contents

While analyzing social and cultural meaning created by proliferation and homogenization of Western-style facilities, such as hotels, and, in particular, emphasizing establishment and development of hotels in non-western societies (Japan and Asia), this course examines a number of case studies. By comparative analysis, it elucidates the nature of cultural space "hotels" in cities established as a consequence of globalization and localization brought on by the mobility that includes tourism.

With the ferocity of Covid-19, now in its third year, and Russia's invasion of Ukraine last winter, the "norm" of the past is no longer applicable in everyday life. Under these circumstances, there is also growing momentum in the tourism sector to fundamentally rethink the existing system with regard to the value of the experience that "journey" creates. However, in order to deepen such discussions, it is necessary not only to pay attention to existing tourism administration and institutional design, but also to take an "external" perspective on the development path of the modern tourism sector itself. In this lecture, as one of such external perspectives, taking up "outlaws' journey", which falls outside the framework of modern tourism, and delve into the relationship between freedom and mobility. By doing so, we try to present the breadth and depth of the possible "freedom" for human beings by taking a complex view of the modern development of tourism, precisely because "free mobility" tends to be enclosed nowadays.

Course Contents

In this lecture, we will concretely examine the "extreme journey" that falls outside the usual tourism model, taking it as a challenge to the "free human figure" that tries to leave the restraints of modern institutions and systems.

The fundamental relationship between freedom and mobility is approached through individual cases of 'adventurers' and 'illegal border crossers', based on two aspects: the 'relentless challenge to nature' and the 'practice for overcoming ideology'.

In order to achieve the above objectives, the following lecture schedule will be used to examine the issues sequentially, and the overall discussion will be summarised at the end of lecture.

Sessions 1 to 3: Guidance and presentation of the analytical framework

Sessions 4 to 7: The "Nature" section examines the challenges of individuals who have found extreme freedom in confronting bare nature.

Session 8: Summary of the "Nature" section

Sessions 9 to 12: The "Thought" section focuses on people who pursue the "self" and resist absurdity in the face of ideological domination.

Session 13: Summary of the "Thought" section

Session 14: Summary of the whole course

The purpose of this class is to examine the social roles and characteristics of travel based on the acquisition of basic knowledge regarding travel in the early modern period and to learn about the travel culture and exchanges that were nurtured as a result.

What are 'these kind of aspects'? The discipline of anthropology, since its beginnings, has focused on the fact that there are aspects of people's lives that cannot be counted, measured or verbalized. Feelings, fear, joy, atmosphere, air, setting, emotions, relationships, forms, dreams, space, existence of the supernatural and so on. Here, the "unquantifiable" appearing in such lives is provisionally called an "image" by the Anthropologist Tadashi Yanai. At present, in the world of Anthropological research, attempts to capture images on film of people in various expression of everyday life are becoming popular. This is boosted by the widespread use of media that appeals to the senses (sensory media), such as video cameras, mobile phones and video sharing sites. This discipline does not study video production itself, but as an expressive technique of "cultural exchange" (= fluidity of culture) in the Department of Culture and Tourism Studies, we learn the methods and perspectives of visual ethnography in anthropology and folklore studies as the complexity of modern society is increasingly difficult to grasp using logic and static tools.

As we learned in the second year seminars, this is because it is virtually impossible within the limitations of time, technology and basic knowledge. Therefore, in order to handle the techniques of visual anthropology and ethnography in this discipline by ourselves, we will focus on "movement in the city", the fluidity of countless people constantly changing and the vernacular (non-mainstream = people's local culture and way of life), as well trying aspects of basic video work. Of course, this is a small part of the activity, and the same as in the spring semester classes, we will continue to read and critique visual works including circular reading, and documentary and film related to visual expressions in anthropology and folklore studies.
