(1) Purpose of class

The purpose of this lecture is to understand the essence of the Japanese Constitutional Law. Students will learn the necessary essence of the Constitution. Specifically, the aim is for the class to progress explaining the various constitutional issues, constitutional precedents, and various theories for students to understand. In addition, we will consider the development of educated university students, as well as measures for the teacher recruitment exam.

(2) Acquiring the ability to learn.

Acquisition and understanding of systematic knowledge related to the Japanese Constitutional Law (knowledge and understanding).

(3) Class objectives

The goal of this class is gaining essential knowledge of the Japanese Constitutional Law. For this, we need to understand the origins of the Constitution, and how it is enacted. In addition, what is "consensus" in interpreting the statute, and how would one interpret "correctly" to arrive at a final answer on "what is constitutional law" or "what is the Japanese Constitutional Law"? Furthermore, the aim is for students to express their own words regarding this question.

Course Contents

The class overview is, firstly, the historical development of the constitution (constitutional history, history of enactment, including the legislative process etc.), secondly, we examine Japanese Constitutional Law focusing on its three major principles: sovereignty of the people, pacifism, and respect for basic human rights, and thirdly, we will consider what influence the Japanese Constitutional Law has had on Japanese society in reality.

In addition, in the course of classes, tutors will keep language simple and maintain interactive dialogues.

(1) Purpose of class

The aim of this class is to understand the essence of law and legislature. Students will learn the necessary elements for understanding the essence of law and legislature. Specifically, class will progress outlining the various fields of law, while mixing legal issues, judicial precedents and theories for the purpose of student understanding. In addition, we will consider the development of educated university students, as well as measures for the teacher recruitment exam.

(2) Acquiring the ability to learn.

Gaining systematic knowledge of law and legislature (knowledge and understanding).

(3) Class objectives

The goal of this class is gaining essential knowledge of law. In addition, students will cultivate the ability to find what the legal issue is when conflict occurs in daily life. For this, we need to understand the origins of law, and how it is enacted. In addition, what is "consensus" in interpreting the statute, and how would one interpret "correctly" to arrive at a final answer on "what is law" or "what is study of law"? Furthermore, the aim is for students to express their own words regarding this question and acquire fundamental skills to independently proceed their study of law as needed in the future as well as to foster the legal concepts and perspectives.

Course Contents

The law is in fact familiar to us (details explored in class). Furthermore, this subject is an essential part of the introductory stage for studying criminal, civil and commercial law. This class is for students to understand the kind of influence law and legislation has in the real world.

The class will progress in according to the following "Class Plan", and so please refer to this: In this class, as well as examining domestic laws such as public law (constitutional, penal and administrative law etc.), we will deepen our understanding of the whole of law, also outlining private law and social law (Labor Law, Social Security Law etc.) in addition to international law. In addition, in the course of classes, tutors will keep language simple and maintain interactive dialogues.

We will equip you with the knowledge to understand the development and characteristics of Japanese society through historical methods, providing an overview of the modern history of Japan, from the end of the Edo period up until the Asia-Pacific War, from the perspective of political diplomatic and popular history

However, instead of simply memorizing matters in chronological order, try to find a historical way of thinking that "enriches awareness of the current situation while interacting with history."

Course Contents

In this lecture, we will follow the flow of a complex history by following various "establishment and development" processes such as the movement of the formation of a modern state for restoration reform from the end of the Tokugawa shogun ate and the Restoration period, the movement from the promulgation of the Imperial Constitution to the establishment of the imperial constitution system from the ordinary road of constitutional government, and the formation of a colonial empire by foreign war. The image of modern Japanese history can be regarded as a tenno-based state(Emperor system nation) or a nation-state, but in this lecture, modern history is considered in the framework of "nationalization" and "subjectification". There may be changes in the content of the class plan depending on the flow of the class and the interest of the students.

With an overview of Japan's modern history since the Asia-Pacific War, from the perspective of political, diplomatic history as well as social history, we will understand why Japan advanced to war, how control and mobilization were constituted, the overall picture of war and its legacy.

As in Japanese history 1, try to find a historical way of thinking that "enriches awareness of the current situation while interacting with history," rather than simply memorizing matters in chronological order.

Course Contents

In this lecture, regarding the modern history of Japan during the Empire of Japan, we will confirm the collapse process of the empire, that is, the expansion policy to mainland China, the cooperative relationship with the great powers, the entry into the Asia-Pacific War, and the trends in the 1930s to the 1940s and the development of postwar society. The society after the war that the present age history deals with is thought as a problem of the inheritance of the all-out war system. Moreover, the present age history is thought by the frame of "Compelling self-sacrifice" and "Respect for individual human rights". In addition, the problem of the war ruins and the war outlook is treated in the class. The content of the class plan may be changed depending on the flow of the class and the interest of the students.
