#### 授業の目標 (Course Objectives)

The course employs fundamental sociological theories and methods to explain and explore the emergence and functioning of contemporary social systems.

Upon completion of the course the students are expected to:

- become familiar with basic theories and methods of Sociology,
- be able to use theoretically consistent frames of reference to make statements about social facts, actions, institutions, and structures,
- use the comparative historical method to explain social forces beyond social and economic transformation,
- be able to combine conceptual frameworks of sociology, economics, and political science to analyze multi-dimensional social events.

#### 授業の内容 (Course Contents)

In our study of society we employ an historical approach. We will explore the economic, political, and social processes that have radically transformed human societies over the past three centuries and contributed to the emergence of modern social systems. Particular attention will be given to the emergence of modern social institutions that facilitate and structure social interaction. Problems of power, coercion, and authority will be discussed in the context of relations between state and society, as well as a less structured context of social interaction. We will also examine problems of social stratification and social order.

Relations between economy and society will be an important part of this course. We will explore the emergence of modern Western capitalist economies and the role of non-economic factors in this process. Markets, as well as other socio-economic systems, will be examined as a part of a broad institutional and cultural framework.

Social change will conclude our discussion. We will investigate its causes, forms, and outcomes in a combination of historical and international perspectives. While evolutionary change will be at the center of our inquiry, we will also touch upon revolutions as a special case of social change.

By the end of this course you are expected to be familiar with main conceptual frameworks of sociology, to be able to apply these frameworks to the analysis of empirical facts, to discuss social problems in an informed and consistent way.

Each student will have to write a research paper (approximately 5 pages) and discuss the project in class. The selection of topics for research paper will be made available to students in the first week of the class. Both the paper and the presentation will be graded. There will be a mid-term and a final exam.
